MOTORCYCLE SAFETY

Saturday afternoon Sharon and I took a trip up north of our place to get our riding legs (or should I say butts) ready for this season. After abbreviated riding seasons for the last 2 years due to 2 accidents in a 14 month period, I approach this riding season more cautiously than usual. That caution paid off in a close one. As we approached 29 Mile Road traveling south on Van Dyke I saw a van stopped at the red light (red for 29 Mile Road traffic). I slowed, half expecting him to turn right on red forcing me to brake. He was having a very animated conversation on his cell phone. He did the unexpected. He accelerated slowly through the red light and went straight across the intersection presenting the full side profile of his van. This blocked any escape route. Having that cautious approach to riding (and that intersection)

was the only thing that provided that cushion of response time to avoid broad siding another vehicle. This time with a passenger on the back. If I had been driving more aggressively it might have turned out like the picture below left. The rider, car driver and car passenger car were all killed.





That close call made me think again about riding and motorcycle safety. Some of our members asked about Motorcycle Safety Courses. For those members and for anyone else interested, copies of the Macomb and Schoolcraft Colleges listings of Motorcycle Safety Courses are shown below. They are also shown on our web site. We need to be responsible for ourselves, but also watch out for inattentive drivers and sometimes even aggressive drivers. We all had or know someone that had an experience where someone driving on 4 wheels who wanted the space you were in and took it.

The first of my 2 accidents came in August of 2003. It involved an older gentleman driving towards me. He suddenly swung into the left turn lane and seconds later made a left turn about 50 or 60 feet in front of me. I was cruising south on Livernois at about 35 MPH. I am not just saying that because it happen to be the speed limit, I was doing 35 MPH because the last 3 times I was on that stretch there was a radar car near that intersection. I had just enough time to start a swerve trying to go around the back of his car, and get my hand and foot on the brakes. I can't say for sure the brakes actually had time to slow the bike. I did manage to avoid the passenger compartment. I heard the bang of my body and bike hitting the rear quarter panel of the car. My body passed over the trunk and landed about 50 feet past the impact point and I felt my body hit the ground.

The second came after getting my new bike. I stopped at a stop sign on 26 Mile Road heading east. As I accelerated away from the stop sign. I was struck from behind by a van about half way across the intersection. The lady behind me ran the stop sign. As she said later she just misjudged the distance (she never explained if it was distance from me or the stop sign). See the second photo above right of someone not so lucky. He was killed by a school bus that didn't quite stop in time. I played these two incidences through my mind a million times to see if there was something I should have done differently. I have for several years now planned on taking another Motorcycle Safety Course refresher. This year I will sign up...and soon. Classes fill up quickly. Shown below are 3 pages from the MCC (web site www.macomb.edu) and 2 pages of the Schoolcraft College (www.schoolcraft.edu/ces) on line course offerings. I know I need a refresher to break myself of any learned bad habits, sharpen my riding skills, and help keep safety in the front of my mind. I highly recommend the Motorcycle Safety Courses even for experienced riders.

The Motorcycle Rider and Safety Education Program is conducted with Michigan Safety Education funds from a grant administered by the Michigan Secretary of State. NOTE: State Law for ALL RIDERS

Upon completion of the approved Motorcycle Safety Foundation course the Michigan Secretary of State will waive the riding skills test required for a cycle endorsement. The written test must still be taken. You MUST provide your own protective eye wear (glasses or goggles), helmet, boots, gloves, long sleeved jacket or shirt, long pants and rain gear if needed. This equipment is required at the first class session. You are required to be on time for each session and must attend each session. You should be able to ride a two wheel bicycle and must be 15 years of age or older. Motorcycles are provided for the Basic Rider Course unless otherwise stated. No refunds after first day of class.



This Motorycle Rider Course is offered for someone who has minimal experience operating a motorcycle. Participants must be at least 15 years of age and must be able to ride a two-wheel bicycle. For students under 18 years of age, a parent must sign a waiver that will be given to the student the first day of class. \$25. You must be present for the entire class;
students arriving late by 5 minutes or more for
the first class session will not be allowed in the
course, and no refund will be given. You must
be on time for and attend all class and riding

may not be allowed to seek the class of the course. You may not be allowed to continue in the class if, in the judgment of the instructor, you present a hazard to yourself or the other students or instructors, and no refund will be given. The instructor's decision is final.

Who should take the **Motorcycle Safety Courses?**

- Those who want to learn to ride safely and are able to ride a two-wheel bicycle
- Those who fail the State riding skills test

Upon successful completion of a Stateapproved Motorcycle Safety Foundation course, the Secretary of State will waive the riding skills test required for a cycle endorse-ment. However, a short written test required for license endorsement will be given at the Secretary of State at the time of endorsemen application. In addition to the short written test, given at the Secretary of State, a more extensive test will be given as part of the Management of the state of the state of the state of the Management of the state of the state of the Management of the state of the state of the state of the Management of the state of the state of the state of the Management of the state Motorcycle course. You must take the Basic Rider Course if you fail the State skills test twice or if you are under 18 years of age.

For your protection, all motorcycle classes require you to have the following protective clothing, and rain gear, if necessary!

Long sleeve jacket or heavy shirt: Arms must be covered while riding. It is best to dress in layers according to the weather. The outermost layer must have long sleeves.

Long pants: No shorts. We suggest jeans. Man-made materials will melt when exposed to heat from engines or exhaust pipes.

Helmet: DOT-approved helmet.

Eye protection: Goggles or glasses (no face shields, they make it harder to hear instructions).

Gloves: Driving gloves are fine. Any gloves will do, as long as they fit your hand and are full-fingered.

Boots or heavy shoes: Your ankles must be covered. A shoe or boot with a six-inch top is fine. No high heels. No high-top tennis shoes are permitted.

of us racer-types suspect the bike is a prototype of a BMW factory MotoGP racing effort in 2007; when the maximum displacement is lowered from the current 990cc to 800cc. Rumor has it the bike is powered by a three-cylinder engine, although unclear whether it's an "in line" or "V" configuration. Apparently this "test vehicle" has been ridden only at BMW facilities but will soon be tested at other circuits. That means more "spy photos" and hopefully more detailed specs on the bike. And no…it does not have a driveshaft. Race bikes have chains!
