

The trees still had their leaves. We only passed 3 cars, two of these pulled over to let us go by. The third car was going slow but on a straight section of road so we could easily pass.

We went to the Legs Inn in Cross Roads Village. We arrived early to avoid the crowds and any possibility that the rain would turn to snow. Dinner was great. Our waitress was light hearted knowing that Sunday was her last day for the season and joked around with us. Not being crowded we ate at a leisurely pace enjoying the bantering and story telling. Some customers thought we were a little crazy because of the cold and precipitation. That was reinforced after they heard we rode up from Detroit. Finishing dinner early, we mounted up and headed to the cabin while there was still light. We stopped in Petoskey for gas to eliminate the need for an early morning stop. We wound our way back to the cabin. Thank goodness Rhys knows the roads so well. I don't believe anyone else could have found that cabin again. All 4 bikes were parked in the garage and we headed in for the night.

Rhys, ever the good host, made ice cream floats with vanilla ice cream and your choice of root beer or Vernor's. We settled in to watch the Detroit Tigers play...couldn't get a clear signal so switched to plan B; the video tapes. We started watching a John Wayne movie but continued talking most of the way through the movie. It turns out Ken; the newest member of the crew is also a boater. He crewed on Port Huron to Mackinaw and Chicago to Mackinaw races. He also had recently ridden down south to ride the Dragon. I keep repeating this but, the people in this group have had some great experiences. It is always interesting to sit down as a group and listen to some of the things our members have done. We stayed up late enough to hear

the final score of the Tigers game and then hit the sheets. With only 4 participants this year we each got a room to ourselves. Mine was the living room couch, I found it very comfortable.

We woke early to find it snowing. About ½ to ¾ inch of snow accumulated before we pushed our bikes out of the garage. It was a little slippery with the snow on top of the leaves and grass. Rhys, Ives and Ken all confirmed that it was 34 degrees as we left the cabin. We decided to head the most direct route back to the interstate. Heading down a hill on a curvy road as we approached the interstate the temperature dropped to 32. It continued to snow for the next hour and a half. The roads were wet with plenty of spray from the passing cars. The snow collected on our windshields and worked its way up, then over the top of the windshield hitting the face shield of our helmets.

We stopped for breakfast at the Lumber Jack Inn just off of I-75. We got more than our share of funny looks. Everyone was still warm and dry. We were finally out of the snowbelt and needed the breakfast break. They let us spread out our riding gear on some of the unused booths to give it a chance to dry out and come up to temperature. It also gave us an opportunity to call our wives to let them know we were okay and heading home.

Heading south on I-75, I broke off from the group at I-475 north of Flint. Heading east on I-69 I felt it was getting warmer. It was a great trip and well worth the time.
