### Some of my favorite UP stops

I went to school in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and as my father's family was from the U.P., I claim to be half-Yooper by birth. My first "long distance" motorcycling was done in the Copper Country of the Keweenaw peninsula, and we've done a fair amount of vacationing in the U.P., so I thought I'd share some of our favorite places in the Eastern UP. Inclusion in my list doesn't mean it is the best place in the world, not being on my list doesn't mean a place isn't worth of merit, these are just places that may not be obvious places to stop. One word of warning: these aren't usually "stop, look, go" places – our preferred travel pace is rather leisurely, not "rack up as many miles as possible".

#### One the way:

Westbranch, MI I-75 Exit 212: **Lumberjack Restaurant:** We enjoy this place enough that we tend to twist our vacations a bit so we either stop for a meal or stay the night here. It's not that far from Detroit, but we sometimes use it as a stopping point for vacations started in the evening after leaving work. Place is attached to the Quality Inn in Westbranch, which we also found quite nice. Food is good, decor is that of a lumber camp, fun gift shop.

**Mackinaw City:** I'm going to end up short-changing this city. I'll admit my bias: I don't consider it being "up north" until we've crossed over The Bridge. However, we have stopped at the Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse which is worth a tour, and the beach there. The beach extends UNDER the Mackinac Bridge, so if you take your boots off, you can stick your one foot in Lake Michigan and one foot in Lake Huron at the same time. The lighthouse tour was interesting. There is an extracost "climb the lighthouse tower" tour, which was fun, but it turns out I'm not a big fan of spiral staircases...so that was a bit more exciting than we perhaps anticipated.

**Mackinaw Bridge:** This may not be an attraction for everyone. I've gone over this bridge in some pretty nasty weather (in a four-wheeled vehicle), so doing it in a motorcycle wasn't a big deal to me, but be advised, if you haven't gone over it before: it's very long, very high, it tends to be a bit windy. However, only two vehicles have ever gone over the railings and fell off the bridge (and one was a deliberate suicide), and neither was a motorcycle. You will make it over!. Center lane are an open grating which will make your vehicle wiggle a bit, if you look down, you can see the water under the bridge. Outer lane is normal pavement, but closer to the guard rail. You may not get to decide – perpetual maintenance often has one or another lane closed. You pay a toll at the UP side of the bridge.

St. Ignace: We've made entire vacations in this town. Lots to do, lots of fun tourist traps.

#### Places to eat:

**Driftwood:** Nice general sit-down restaurant. We've always received great service, even when walking in 5 minutes before closing time.

**Java Joe's:** Much more than the coffee shop the name implies. Great breakfast, lunch and dinner. The cinnamon bread sticks are highly recommended. NOT a fast place – when busy, you may end up waiting an hour before your food hits your table. But we think it is worth the wait when you can. And the owner, Joe, is a character worth meeting. Open most of the time in peak season, drops off in winter. Note: Joe is a vegetarian ("Indian word for 'lousy hunter'", according to a bumper sticker on Joe's own car), so plenty to chose from if you wish to avoid meat, but plenty of good meat to eat, too.

**Jose's Cantina:** Owned and operated by Jose, who looks suspiciously like Joe from Java Joe's. As Jose says, "Best Mexican within 75 miles." Also the only Mexican food within 75 miles, but

really, it is great. We've had a small party there, and the staff bent over backwards to help us put it all together. Nice waterfront view (and violates our observation that "the better the view, the worse the food"). Again, great choices for both vegetarians and meat eaters.

#### St. Ignace Places to stay:

Our favorite is the **Quality Inn Lakefront:**. They have a number of rooms with very nice hot tubs, all rooms have a small fridge, most rooms have a great view. Seasonal, closes for the winter. Easy walk to both Java Joe's and Jose's Cantena.

**Driftwood:** Small, simple and cheap rooms. Clean, but spartan. Open year round. Apparently popular with bikers and snowmobilers, and usually the first place in town to turn on the "Sorry, Full!" sign, and attached to the Driftwood restaurant and bar.

We've also stayed at a few other places, all have been fine.

**St. Ignace activities:** These are just some of the things to do.

**Mackinac Island:** I love the boat ride. I don't really "get" the island itself. Most people seem to like the charm of a town with no powered vehicles (except for emergency vehicles, construction vehicles, golf carts, airplanes and snowmobile after the tourists are gone in the winter), I find it a reminder of the charms of the modern motor vehicle. Primary source of transportation is horses. You may talk about the dirty emissions of motor vehicles, but I'd much rather be around the exhaust of my old two-stroke Suzuki T500 over the exhaust and emissions of an island full of horses (hint: don't step in a puddle, especially if it hasn't just rained). It's an island full of tourist traps. I do like the boat ride, we've actually done the ride out, went into one store, and been on the next boat back and enjoyed it. I've found it better to visit in the cool weather of early spring or late fall – cold weather keeps the smell down.

Evening Fireworks: Saturday nights through the summer, the city has fireworks.

**Vesper Cruise:** Some years ago, we found out a local church was doing free (keep reading) Friday sunset "Vesper Cruises" to and around the Mackinac Bridge Bring a jacket! Yes, church group, but it wasn't too "in-your-face" with the religion, I find it hard to believe anyone of any faith would find it offensive. They do pass the hat to help pay for renting of the boat and staff, I think we put in \$20 each (which was more than they requested). Unfortunately, not sure if it is still being done.

**Cut River Bridge:** On US-2, 25 miles west of St. Ignace. I crossed this bridge dozens of times without realizing it was more than a way to get cars across a river. First of all, if you don't have an altimeter, you probably won't realize how high up you are – like me, you probably assumed you were right near Lake Michigan near lake level, but you are actually almost 150ft above lake level. Park on either side of the bridge in the designated parking spots, you can cross the river in the barricaded from the road sidewalks, get to the other side, climb down a stair case, cross UNDER US-2, come up on the other side, walk along the other sidewalk on the bridge, and cross under the bridge on the other end. All free. You can probably make it a 15 minute stop, or turn it into an all-day event if you are into hiking (there are trails down to and along the river).

**Mystery Spot:** Pure tourist trap. I'll give away the punchline that there's no mystery, it's all just a matter of playing with perspective. Still, even though I knew how it was done, it was fun. Staff was very nice, took good care of us.

**Lake Michigan Beaches along US-2:** Between St. Ignace and the Cut River Bridge, US-2 hugs Lake Michigan, with some very very nice beach front between the road and the lake. We are talking about TWO MILES of beach here...and you can pull your car over to the side of the road and get out and play in the lake or on the beach. These beaches have the water to the west, if you get a chance to watch the sunset over Lake Michigan, it's highly recommended. About 11 miles west of St. Ignace.

**Lehtos' Pasties:** This is one of the best and highest regarded UP Pasties around. On US-2, about six miles west of St. Ignace on the lake side of the road. They sell 'em warm, cold, frozen. Get a few warm, then eat on the beach...(don't forget the ketchup. While some like gravy on their pasties, supposedly ketchup is more authentic.). Note: you will find a variety of Pasty style in the area and across the UP.

#### Sault Ste. Marie:

**Soo Locks:** I'd consider this a "U.P. Must See". I've lived within a mile of water traveled by lake freighters almost my entire life, so they are not quite the amazing bit of transportation that many people might find them to be, but it is still amazing watching these big ships go through the Soo Locks.

**Soo Lock Boat Tours:** Just do this. Took us too long to get around to doing this. In addition to the locks themselves, you tour a small Canadian lock you may not have known existed, and some industrial ship docks.

**Point Iroquois Lighthouse:** You can hit this between Sault St. Marie and Tahquamenon Falls. It's another lighthouse tour, similar to the Mackinaw City lighthouse, but a lot less people there. What I said about the spiral staircase in Mackinaw City applies here..and then some, as this is a tighter spiral. Once you get to the top, quite a view. Then you have to go down the stair case again. Good news, no evidence of anyone ever getting stuck at the top.

**Tahquamenon Falls:** There are actually TWO stops -- the upper and lower falls. You want to go to both. If you paid the \$10 extra for your license plate, free admission to this state park. Tourist-trappy stuff at both, more at upper falls, iirc. Lots of walking, and good hiking opportunities, if you are into such things. Getting there by bike is fairly fun – none of the roads are straight. First time we went by bike, Paula said she enjoyed the ride even more than the falls. I find the late afternoon sun less than optimal for viewing the falls (you end up looking into the sun), so my recommendation is to get there before the sun gets too low.

Again, this is just *some* of the things we've found to do in the eastern UP. One of these days, I'll write up the western UP...might look more like a book, though. Watch for deer when driving through the UP, and keep your speed close to the posted speed limits. In the evening, watch for swarms of bugs.

#### Lake Huron Ride Report

I hear that some MC Beemers may be showing for the Yooper Madness Ride, so I thought you also may be interested in how the Lake Huron Ride turned out.

We had 24 Riders and 3 Pillions departed Imlay City in drizzling rain. Before we reached Port Huron the rain became heavy. It had let-up a bit by the time we hit customs and had ended by the time we reached London. One vet IBA Rider had a split seam in his jacket and road for home after reaching Sarnia because he said not only his undies, but socks were soaked, too. He said he will be doing the Yooper Ride.

The weather was great for the balance of the ride, with temps in the low 80's up on the north shore of Lake Huron near North Bay & Sudbury. One group of Riders saw a young bear in the median near Sudbury (in the middle of the day, no less). And after getting our last mandatory receipt in Burton, we hit some rain before pulling into the Speedway in Imlay City.

The two rabbits, Jeff (ST1300) and Ken (R1200GSA) were the first in at 12:30 am. A few minutes later a Rider on an H-D EVO pulled in. Next in at about 1:45 were three new IBA Riders: A husband and wife from Marlette, Carl & Marcia, each on Victory Cross County's and Tom (ST1300). The balance of the Riders arrived at about 3:45 am , including myself. I had been riding with two new IBA Riders, Alan (FJR1300ES) from Quebec and Mike (GL1500) from Casco Twp. who I met in Sarnia. We made a few extra gas stops because of Mike's relatively lower range.

Crossing the Bridge was a snap; no wind, traffic, or lane closures and it was dark, so I couldn't see how far down the water is.

When we arrived at Harrison for a mandatory gas stop, our group combined with a group of about 9 other bikes and we all headed to Burton for our last gas stop. The weather was nice and cool, and traffic was nil. I was impressed by the riding skill of all the Riders that late in the game. It was like poetry in motion. We were doing about 68 mph but before we reached Flint, Mike decided to charge a bit and pulled around the pack and started cruising at 73, so the three of us reached Burton a few minutes before the balance of the combined group did.

There were 12 other Riders that did the ride, but started & ended at other locations along the route. We did see a few of them at some of the gas stops.

Ishii from Farmington Hills started & ended there, but made an appearance in Imlay City before we departed. Ishii rides a Burgman 400. He did 1,131 miles in 21.58 hours for an overall average of 52.4 mph. The rabbits had a moving average of 55.3 mph. Pat, Marcia and Tom had an overall average of 51.8 mph. Yes, less than Ishii's !! The balance of the Riders averaged about 47.6 mph. Once again Ishii demonstrated, "To go Far, Stop Quick".

30 new IBA numbers will be issued on the ride!!!

IMHO, we need more MC Beemers with IBA numbers and displaying that "Worlds Toughest Riders" license plate backer. Hope to see you in Houghton Lake August 22nd!!
