A Typical First Track Day

Last month, I covered the basics of track days. OK, so you picked a track and signed up with a track day provider and prepped the motorcycle. What's next?

First, you need to decide on how you will get to the track. Do you ride your bike or trailer? Riding seems easier but you will have to do your taping and mirror removal at the track. And how will you carry the basic necessities, like a chair or shade or cooler?

So some people do ride but I think the better option is to trailer. It gives you the space to bring all of the things that make a track day enjoyable. The basic list includes: tools, pop-up canopy if available, cooler, water, chairs, gas cans, and a tire pressure gauge. These items will get you through your first day.

Next, you need to decide when to arrive at the track. In Michigan, the tracks are 3-4 hours away from Detroit. You can drive or ride up the morning of the track day but I suggest getting there the day before. If you want to camp, both MI tracks allow camping and hotels are available nearby. Get a good night's sleep and get to the track early. If you rode there, make sure that you come to the track with a full tank.

The track opens at 7:00am. There will be a line to get in and you will have to sign a release and pay a nominal gate fee. Then you can find a spot in the paddock to set up your pit area. Get settled in and wait for the announcements.

Go to the Sign Up area and get checked in. They will verify your ID and riding group (Novice, Intermediate, Advanced) and give you a wrist band of the appropriate color.

Then you get your bike to the Tech Inspection area (normally near the center of the activity) and get checked. The inspector will go over the bike to make sure you have taped all glass and have decent tires. He will check your throttle to make sure that it returns on its own and he will give an overall safety check. He will then give you a sticker for the front of your bike.

Next up will be the Riders Meeting. All riders MUST attend the Riders Meeting every day. The organizers will cover all of the flags that will be used and all of the procedures that need to be followed. At the end of the meeting, the Novice riders will be held for a separate meeting.

In the Novice Riders meeting, you will be split up into smaller groups of 3-5 depending on total group size and available Control Riders. A Control Rider is a member of the track day organization that will work with each group throughout the day. You will be asked how experienced you are. Then the smaller groups will be based on your self-described ability from slow to fast. Remember your group number!

Generally, there will be six to seven 20 minute sessions per group per day with the rotation of Advanced, Intermediate and Novice groups each hour. A one hour lunch break will occur between session 4 and 5. Riding will happen rain or shine.

Finally, the track announcement will be made: "Novice Riders – 10 minute call". You will have 10 minutes to get fully dressed and ride your bike to the Pit Out area. Pit Out is where you will enter the actual track. This will be disclosed in the Riders Meeting.

Assemble at Pit Out and wait for the Control Riders. When released, you will enter the track and follow the Control Rider. In the Novice group, the first session will be at a very slow pace with no passing allowed.

You will learn the racing line and the layout of the track. At the end of each session, you will be required to assemble in the meeting area for further instruction. Each session will be focused on improving your ability and will cover things like line choice, body position, brake markers, etc.

As you progress, you will get faster and more comfortable. If you are faster than your group, you can be moved up and if you are feeling pressure, you can move down. The goal is to learn and have fun.

At the end of the day, you can check with the Track Photographer. You can get a CD of all the pictures they have of you on the track.

So I hope these articles have peaked your interest to get out there and ride the track. If you decide to go, let me know. It's always fun at the track!
