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Prez Sez



Greetings Beemers, and a Very Happy New Year! Here is a good resolution, to have a great riding season this year with many quality riding miles.

As a kid born in the mid 1900's, I remember trying to figure out how old I was going to be when the year 2000 came around. Well here we are looking at 2017, and looking back over the years I tend to think about my love affair with motorcycles. As a young kid, I used to stop whatever I was doing to watch a motorcycle pass by. Most of them were Harley's, BSA's, or Triumph's, and a couple Honda's. I don't remember seeing to many BMW's in Butte, Montana. I know there were a couple. Then came the day I got to ride on a real motorcycle not just one of those little

Briggs and Stratton mini-bikes (which I would have loved to own), but a real bike, a Kawasaki 750 that my sister's boyfriend had. He took me for about a half hour ride that I begged into an hour. We rode all over town, mom wasn't too please when we got back because she didn't like motorcycles. I was probably 10 or 11. Next came my own motorcycle, a '76 Yamaha XT500 (Thumper) with a SuperTrap tail pipe. This bike was beat up when I got it, so I didn't mind continuing the torture by riding it everywhere. Even followed my brother along the railroad tracks across two train trellises (not too bright, seemed to be fun at the time though). The mountains around Butte were a great place to play in the dirt until the Bureau of Land Management closed everything down. Sold it just before leaving Montana. It was about 4 years before I would buy another bike, an '84 Honda Silverwing GL500 Interstate. A nice bike but a little underpowered and would buzz at interstate speeds. Rode that around here in Michigan for a few years and took it over to Wisconsin for a long weekend. I don't think you can forget your first motorcycle trip through Chicago, wasn't sure I was going to survive that one. Been through there a few times since and really try to avoid it. I sold it just before meeting Lynn, didn't seriously look for about 8 years. Then started looking on line then my boss bought a BMW and got me looking at them too. Found my 2002 R1150R down in Virginia, borrowed a trailer and brought it home. My first ride was just around the block to see if I even remembered how to ride. Before I got to the second corner, it all came flooding back and I was having a blast riding it. I upgraded in 2010 to the K1200LT, loved how it handled, I even liked how it handled at slow speeds, I found it very predictable and easy to ride. My only problem was that my roots were riding dirt roads and every time I saw one on the LT, I would think, I wonder where that goes. I even tried to take the LT on a two track once (key work ONCE). That LT didn't seem to like the dirt too much, or at least with me on its back. So now came the 2013 R1200GS I bought in 2014. I really do think that it is probably the best all-around motorcycles out there. I really miss the LT's electric windshield and the true cruise control, but I love the ability to see a dirt road and find out where it goes. Here in Michigan, you tend to find out that most of them are filled with sugar sand and then you quickly find out that the even a Kawasaki KLT250S really does weigh as much or more than that LT after you have picked it up a couple (7) times within a two mile stretch of road.

Well that was a lot longer than I thought it was going to be. So onto what the club has going on in 2017. First off, the officers for this year are the same as last year. They are listed above here in the Newsletter. The next meeting is 14 January at the BMW Motorcycles of Detroit dealership just South of 15 mile rd. on VanDyke. Our meetings are the Second Saturday of each month at the dealership. Next up will be the MC Beemers Planning Meeting to be held during the February club meeting. This is your chance to bring ideas for events or lunch rides or anything you want the club to do this next year. Last year the officers got together and came up with a few new rides and the dates of the traditional rides. This year I want to open this up to the club membership to suggest what you want to do this year. We will still have the more

traditional rides such as the Picnic and the Chicken Dinner of which we will set the dates. Other clubs that I have belonged to have a planning meeting early in the year and they generally work very well, one even makes it a pot luck lunch to help maximize participation. So, in February, bring your thinking caps and ride recommendations and maybe other fun things to do with a group.

Also in February, is the Mid-Winter Banquet. You have probably seen a couple emails from Betty about this so far. The location is Louis' Chop House, South of 23 mile rd. on the West side of Gratiot. We will have a TV and a couple Laptops showing slide shows of our riding adventures this last year. Please get your pictures to Nick so that he can make up the slide shows.

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Editor's Corner



I found (and bought) something at Harbor Freight last month that might be of interest to fellow MCBeemers – their motorcycle dolly. The theory is cool – run your motorcycle up on it, set it on the side stand, and now you can push it around your garage as needed. Reality is a bit different, but for some of us, close enough that it still might be worth the \$100 price.

First of all, the wheels are small, so don't plan on going over expansion joints in your garage easily...if at all. And if you have big cracks or uneven concrete, forget it. My garage slab is not very flat nor smooth, but if I put the bike on the dolly NEAR where it was going, it gave me a the ability to push it in directions the bike wouldn't normally go to make a lot more space available for other

bikes.

The side stand appendage can be placed where your bike needs it, which is good, as there's no standard on that, however, assume you won't get it right the first time, you will have to pull the bike off and reposition it at least once. There's no provisions for center stand, for those of us with K bikes that prefer to keep them on the center stand. I figured I could tolerate the blast of oil smoke for the first start of the season.

I tried three of my bikes on it. The Harley, of course, worked just fine, though some people with really fat rear tires on their HD say it is too narrow. The '85 K100RT worked pretty well, other than having to be on the side stand. The K1200LT was, as is often the case for very low speed handling of an LT, exciting. Once Again, I remembered you can not see either wheel of an LT when either riding it or walking it by standing next to the bike. "Can't see wheels" means putting it on a narrow (?) dolly just won't be easy. Given a second person, might just work fine, but not a one person job unless you are into collecting Bent Beemers. So I'd call it a success on the K100 and the HD, and potential success on the K1200LT. In the end, the dolly ended up under the HD, and it allowed me to snug the Harley into position much easier than it otherwise could be done, leaving much more room for the K100 and LT than I had before. Worth the \$100 to me, and I could probably use at least one more. Though I must say, Harbor Freight doesn't understand Motorcycle Merchandise pricing – only \$100 for a motorcycle accessory?? Wow. Well, I'm not telling them! Assembly was straight forward, though the instructions were horrible, but if you play around with it for a few minutes, you'll figure it out.

While digging through bookmarks on one of my computers today, I came back across Harrison Specialties (no relations, I presume?) – a company that makes (get this) lawn stripers, wood turning tools, plans for DIY projects ... and Corbin compatible seat backs. So, if you have yourself a Corbin seat that accepts the square post backrest and want to pay a fraction of the Corbin cost for one (or just want to see what a lawn striper is), see http://harrisonspecialties.com/. I bought a couple of their backrests a few years ago, turned out they didn't work well for my overweight physique on the K100, but nothing wrong with the product, and glad I didn't spend \$250+ to find that out (AND they work nicely one-up on my LT after getting a Corbin seat)

Mid Winter Banquet is coming up in February. For those that missed it last year, you missed some really good food at Louis' Chop House. They really did a great job hosting us, too, like they wanted us to come back. Part of the banquet is the running slide show...and that involves getting me your riding pictures of last year so I can put it together...so be collecting those pictures!
